## 1995 ARSC Annual Conference Scheduled for September

he Twenty-ninth Annual Conference of the Association for Recorded Sound Collections will be held Sunday, September 17 through Wednesday, September 20. 1995 at the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C. In addition, an optional full-day seminar on "Emergency Preparedness and Disaster Recovery" (for recording archives) is scheduled for Thursday, September 21st.

This year's conference is being held in conjunction with the Internation Association of Sound Archives (IASA) and the International Federation of Television Archives (FIAT) and will include several joint sessions. The Conference will conclude with a banquet that will feature the presentation of the 1995 ARSC Awards for Excellence in Historical Recorded Sound Research. Sessions will be open to the public.

This is certain to provide a significant contribution to the world of record collecting, the kind of project that ARSC sponsorship enhances. It touches the private collector's interests much more than the cataloging rules, the archival indexing or the storage and preservation projects did.

Our latest Journal offers an interesting change of pace from its usual fare. It is important to remember that the Journal editors have only been able to publish what authors submit. If the contents do not represent the interests of all members, the deficiency can only be supplied through the submission of suitable articles by interested authors.

The finalists for this year's ARSC Awards are truly a revelation. When the ARSC Awards for Excellence were launched in 1990, the most competitive fields of research were classical music and jazz. This year there are remarkably fine candidates in almost every field. If the ARSC Awards serve to raise the standards in all fields of recorded sound research, it will be a significant contribution to our understanding of recorded sound.

Come to Washington D.C. for a productive Conference, and plan ahead for Kansas City in May 1996.



# International Conference "Opera in the Eighties"

November 15-21, 1995 in Rome, Italy

The Conference is organized by the Italian Research Institute for Music Theatre in collaboration with the Italian National Sound Archives, within the framework of the project "Musica 2000" sponsored by the *Dipartimento dello Spettacolo della Presidenza del Consiglio dei Ministri* (the Italian government's department for cultural activities).

Twenty presentations by experts from all over the world are scheduled. Some of them will be focused on the works produced by the main opera companies in the decade, while others will be concerned only with world premieres of newlycomposed operas.

The Conference's purpose is to create an opportunity for meeting and discussing the trends and developments in the decade 1980-1990 which have led to the deep transformation in the idea and practice of music theatre performances we are currently witnessing.
