# ARSC CONFERENCE UPDATE

ARSC in Syracuse, May 20-23, 1998

Friday afternoon's sessions will be held at the Landmark Theatre in downtown Syracuse. Opened in 1928 as Loew's State, this facility was designed by Thomas Lamb, and has seen scores of live and film performances over the years. It was rescued from the wrecking ball some 20 years ago and enjoys a new lease on life. Tours of the building will follow the afternoon presentations, which include area composers and performers on their experiences with the recording industry, and some early film sound history.

You may want to plan on arriving early on May 20th, or staying later on the 24th, to take advantage of the sale of duplicate records from the Belfer Archive. This event will run all day May 20th and May 24th, as well as during non-session hours on the days of the conference. The sale includes 78s, 45s, and LPs, and it will be advertised to the local community as well.

Once again, we hope that a very strong program will entice you to come to the convention and be with kindred spirits. Among the highlights already planned:

- Author, performer, and producer Artis Wodehouse will be there with a Yamaha Disklavier discussing her ongoing projects concerning keyboard artists of the 1920s and 1930s.
- ⋄ Lots of discussions about cylinders (for those who are unaware, the Belfer Audio Archives has one of the premiere collections of cylinders in the world), including a Q&A session with the Cylinder Subcommittee, critic and ARSC member David Hamilton talking about his recent work with the Mapleson cylinders, member Jerry Fabris discussing the 1888 cylinder of Thomas Edison's voice, and hopefully a demonstration of Belfer's laser-playback system for cylinders.
- Dr. Martin Elste talking about some recentlydiscovered experimental recordings by Paul Hindemith.
- ⋄ Part II of ARSC member Mike Biel's "History of Instantaneous Recording".
- Joseph Reidy (the lawyer who writes the copyright column for the ARSC Journal), of the law office of Cumpston & Shaw, will talk about domestic copyright issues; and Pekka Gronow will be discussing the European situation.
- ARSC member Gerry Gibson discussing the state of digital preservation at the Library of Congress.

These and many other interesting topics will engage and inform you in the course of three days in Syracuse, New York. I hope to see a record crowd of ARSC members there!

Will ARSC grow or shrink? Will ARSC programs and publications continue or not? Will ARSC have the resources needed to continue its existing activities?

At the Nashville conference in 1997, the membership received a recommendation from the Board of Directors to increase member dues. That initiative failed to gather the necessary majority to pass, despite receiving a majority of more than 55 percent of the vote.

The Board of Directors has responded by again voting to submit for member consideration a dues increase resolution. It is the unanimous view of the Board that ARSC must have more income to maintain its current

schedule of programs. I fully agree with this view.

This time the resolution to be presented to members at the business meeting on Saturday, May 23, 1998 is simple. It calls for a dues increase for individuals of \$6 and for institutions of \$10. If passed, individual member dues for 1999 will amount to \$36, and institutional dues will amount to \$40. It is projected that the dues increase will yield a little over \$6,000. But ARSC has lost at least \$8,000 in buying power since 1991. Passage of this recommendation will replace some, but not all, of the buying power ARSC had in 1991. As you can see, this is purely an inflation dues increase. Our programs and services are being damaged by increasing costs which are not matched by increased income. Think only of the dramatic increase in the price of paper several years ago.

If the resolution does not pass, what happens? Buying power will continue to erode, and in my view programs will have to be reduced or eliminated. The Board of Directors took actions over the last year to begin program reductions. In all probability the ARSC Membership Directory will now be published on cheap paper intended to last only two years. As programs are cut, the benefits realized by members declines, membership shrinks, and a very serious situation becomes gradually more ominous.

Let's avoid the negative scenario. Let's act together to assure that ARSC remains a vibrant association with a wide range of programs and services benefiting its members. Right now, ARSC is the premier association of its kind in the world. I hope you will join me in keeping it that

If you want to continue receiving the ARSC Journal, ARSC Newsletter, the ARSC Membership Directory, news on the Conference, and all of the other good things we send your way, you will need to pay your dues today so we can keep you on the active mailing list.

And remember, the Journal, Newsletter and other publications we send you are only part of the ARSC experience. To capture the full spirit of ARSC, meet other members, and learn much new information not yet published, you need to come to the ARSC Conference in Syracuse. It is a rewarding experience for all those who attend.

Editor's reply:

The essential purpose of ARSC is to promote the preservation and study of historic recordings in *all* fields of music and speech. Basically, ARSC members are private collectors or institutional representatives. It is true that ARSC is not an organization for only jazz collectors. But the same is true regarding opera, orchestral, popular, blues or whatever category of sound recording one chooses. Variety is perhaps the easiest and safest generalization one can make about the interests of the 900 plus ARSC members. Look at any ARSC Conference program to see the tremendous range of subjects presented in a few days. I always find it amazing.

Funny Mr. Mantell should mention the picture of the cylinder phonograph. I ran the picture of the recording demonstration because it provides an example of what ARSC is about. Peter Dilg is a private collector who has experimented on acoustic recording techniques for many years. For the most part acoustic recording is a lost art. At the Conference he shared his knowledge and expertise with those present.

...I find it inexplicable that ARSC — an organisation dedicated to sound collections — should do nothing to encourage original recordings from amongst its own members. Rather, written articles are solicited, abound in profusion, and are awarded prizes. Further, whenever I have floated the suggestion that ARSC should encourage such original recordings I have been shot down in flames. Why? Are all ARSC members POBs (Print oriented illegitimates)?


In Britain I recall competitions for non-professional sound recording enthusiast whose efforts were so good as to be given an airing
